Civil Rights Complaints

David K. Greer, Sr. Investigator

The Labor and Industry Committee and the Criminal Justice Committee worked together to investigate 15 complaints of discrimination, down 64.29% vs previous year.

The top 5 types of complaints were as follows:

- Employment 54.55%
- Education 9.09%
- Murder 9.09%
- Defamation 9.09%
- Public Business 9.09%

The Ohio Civil Rights Commission has jurisdiction to investigate charges of discrimination in the areas of employment, housing, public accommodation (access to services and facilities open to the public), disability in higher education (beyond the high school/secondary level) and credit. The bases protected against discrimination in Ohio are as follows: race, color, sex, disability, age, religion, national origin, ancestry, familial status in housing, military status, marital status (for credit only) and retaliation.

The Ohio Civil Rights Commission has a statute of limitations of six months of the alleged act of discrimination for public accommodation, credit, or disability in higher education complaints, one year for housing complaints, or two years for employment complaints. All charges of discrimination must be filed within those periods following the last occurrence of discriminatory harm and the Ohio Civil Rights Commission cannot investigate acts of discrimination that occurred prior to that date.

You can file a charge of discrimination with the OCRC using the following methods:


