Message From The President

Fellow Citizens,

Before anything else, let me begin with a simple but powerful truth: we are deeply grateful for African American men—for their resilience, their leadership, their creativity, and their unwavering presence in families, communities, and culture. Despite generations of adversity, they have stood tall. They have built, protected, and inspired, often without the recognition or support they deserve. Their strength in the face of systemic obstacles is nothing short of extraordinary, and today, we pause not just to speak on their behalf—but to honor them, as we celebrate Father's Day in the month of June.

These are not coincidences—they are the direct results of centuries of systemic inequity, institutional racism, and generational disinvestment.

And while these challenges are great, so too is the potential. Imagine what could be achieved if African American men were fully supported—through mentorship, mental health resources, job training, educational investment, and justice reform. This is not charity. This is not favoritism. This is the overdue fulfillment of a promise—the promise of equal opportunity for all.

Let's not forget that Black labor has been foundational to the growth of America and our economy. So let us recommit today—not just to expressing appreciation, but to taking action. Let us advocate for policies that uplift Black men, invest in programs that empower them, and change the narrative that has far too often left them behind.

Because when African American men succeed, our communities succeed. Our nation becomes stronger. Our shared future becomes brighter. Let us march on until victory is won!

The Labor and Industry Committee and the Criminal Justice Committee worked together to investigate 16 complaints of discrimination, down 29.03% vs previous year.

The top 5 types of complaints were as follows:

- Employment 43.75%
- Sentencing 12.50%
- Housing 12.50%
- Assault 6.25%
- Lack of Prosecution 6.25%

The Role of the Criminal Justice Committee

The Committee on Criminal Justice shall (1) seek to eliminate harsh and unfair sentencing practices that are responsible for mass incarceration and racial disparities in the prison system; (2) support and seek to increase trust and public safety by advancing effective law enforcement practices; (3) fight for the restoration of the voting rights of formerly incarcerated people and the removal of barriers to employment; (4) elevate the voices of crime victim survivors in order to identify and advance systemic breakdowns existing in the criminal justice system that perpetuate crime; (5) resolve to end the war on drugs for its disproportionate collateral consequences and harm to communities of color; (6) seek the institution and availability of alternatives to incarceration, including education, employment, and mental health services; (7) eliminate zero-tolerance policies implemented in our schools which keep kids out of the classroom and put them on a path from the schoolhouse to the jailhouse; (8) investigate programs implemented in our local law enforcement agencies which derail from their main purpose of safety and order to conduct the work of federal agencies for which they do not have the capacity; and (9) seek budget modifications in states where incarceration receives more funding than education.



NAACP DISCUSSES SOLUTIONS FOR 'ROOT CAUSES' OF CONTINUED YOUTH VIOLENCE IN DAYTON STORY BY WHIO STAFF

THE DAYTON BRANCH NAACP GATHERED TO TALK ABOUT WHAT'S CAUSING KIDS IN DAYTON TO BECOME VIOLENT. AS REPORTED ON NEWS CENTER 7 AT 11:00, LOCAL LEADERS SAY TEN OF THE 40 HOMICIDE VICTIMS IN DAYTON LAST YEAR WERE 18 YEARS OLD OR YOUNGER.

NAACP DAYTON BRANCH PRESIDENT DERRICK FOWARD SAYS THE YOUTH VIOLENCE PROBLEM BECAME A MAJOR FOCUS OVER THE PAST YEAR.

EFFORTS TO MAKE A CHANGE PICKED UP AFTER A MASS SHOOTING ON HOME AVENUE LEFT HALF A DOZEN TEENS HUBT AND TWO PEOPLE DEAD LAST YEAR.

"EVERYBODY WANTS THE AMERICAN DREAM. THE AMERICAN DREAM IS WHAT PROMOTED AMERICA'S GREATNESS. AND THAT GREATNESS NOW IS NOT REALIZED BY MOST OF US. THE DREAM BECOMES A NIGHTMARE," MORRIS BROWN SAYS. BROWN IS THE DAYTON BRANCH NAACP HEALTH COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN AND LED THE MEETING MONDAY NIGHT, WHERE A PANEL OF EXPERTS SHARED WHAT THEY BELIEVE IS CONTRIBUTING TO THE VIOLENCE.

"THE ROOT CAUSES OF VIOLENCE HAVE TO DO WITH SOCIOECONOMIC STATUS, FREQUENTLY AS A START. FAMILY DISUNITY, MENTAL HEALTH ISSUES, SUBSTANCE ABUSE, INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE NOT CONNECTED WITH THE COMMUNITY, INDIVIDUALS THAT PREOCCUPIED WITH SELF-AGGRANDIZEMENT," BROWN SAYS. "WE KNOW THAT AN INDIVIDUAL CAN SEE SO MUCH VIOLENCE THAT THEY BECOME INSENSITIVE TO VIOLENCE, WHERE THEY DON'T FEAR DEATH."

THAT'S WHY BROWN SAYS THE ROOT CAUSE IS A DIRECT RESPONSE TO WHAT THEY HAVE EXPERIENCED SO FAR IN LIFE. HE REFERS TO IT AS "ACES." WHICH STANDS FOR ADVERSE CHILDHOOD EVENTS.

"TRAUMA CAN BE DAD WENT TO PRISON, MOTHER'S AN ALCOHOLIC, A CHILD CAN WITNESS SOMEONE GETTING SHOT, A CHILD CAN BE DODGING BULLETS EVERY NIGHT, THE KIND OF THINGS THAT PEOPLE OF LOW SOCIOECONOMIC LEVEL ARE EXPOSED TO," BROWN SAYS.

FOWARD TOLD NEWS CENTER 7 THAT THE DAYTON BRANCH NAACP IS WAITING FOR THE CITY'S CURE VIOLENCE GLOBAL PROGRAM TO BEGIN SO THEY CAN BE A PART OF IT.

"WE DECIDED TO BE PROACTIVE AND SHOW THE COMMUNITY WHAT IS AVAILABLE NOW," BROWN SAYS. "THIS SOCIETY THAT WE LIVE IN NOW IS TEACHING THEM NOT TO FEAR DEATH, WHICH IS NOT GOOD BECAUSE THEN IT RESULTS TO RECKLESS BEHAVIOR."

MAYOR JEFFREY MIMS WAS ON THE PANEL AND ANNOUNCED THAT THE HOPE PEACE INITIATIVE, WHICH INCLUDES THE CURE VIOLENCE GLOBAL PROGRAM, WILL BE READY TO GO IN THE NEXT WEEKS.

ZANESVILLE – The Muskingum County branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) has been reactivated, according to an announcement from the NAACP.

The local branch has lost members over the years and became inactive.

A planning committee of 12 residents put together a <u>Brunch for Justice</u> in March in to share information and recruit new members. "Once we show proof of the 50 active members, then the (state chapter) will create a letter of recommendation to the national headquarters for our charter then to be re-established," committee member Nancy Edwards previously told the TR.

The local branch was reactivated on May 17 and elected new officers. They are Kyle Johnson, president; Justin Wyatt, vice president, Johnna Ray, second vice president; Nancy Edwards, secretary; Michelle Simpson, assistance secretary; Stacey Duling, treasurer; and Latonya Sowers, assistant treasurer. They were sworn in by Derrick Forward, vice president of the Ohio Conference NAACP and president of the Dayton branch.

"This chapter belongs to the people. That's the truth at the heart of the Muskingum County NAACP's legacy and the guiding light for our future," Johnson said in the announcement. "I step into this role with deep respect for those who came before me...Leaders like Claude Haywood, Helen Russell, and Rev. C.W. Morse built the foundation we now stand on.
